

CW/VFM 77: *Milo Reynolds*

Milo Reynolds enlisted in the 10th Connecticut Volunteers Company D, on September 2nd 1861. He would be wounded on December 14th 1862 in Kinston, NC. Less than two years later he would be killed in action on May 16th, 1864 at Drewry's Bluff, Virginia. The bullet that killed him and the tintype on him were sent home to his family.

- A letter from Pvt. Milo Reynolds of the 10th Connecticut Volunteers to his family. The folder contains a transcript of the letter and a photo-static copy. The letter is simple and speaks mostly of camp life and also sends advice back home. Ms 2 pp. Copy 2pp.
- Correspondence between the donor, Milo W. Scherer and John H. Knickerbocker (director of the Civil War Institute) dated from 23 February 1963 through 6 March 1963 explaining the provenance of the letter. Scherer's letter indicates that Reynolds was killed at "Drurys Bluff" [sic] and a tintype was found on his body.
